# Course Outline IDS 250 Liberal Arts Capstone

#### SECTION I

## SUBJECT AREA AND COURSE NUMBER: IDS 250

## COURSE TITLE: Liberal Arts Capstone

**COURSE CATALOG DESCRIPTION:** An interdisciplinary course focusing on a theme affecting cross sections of humanity. The course is designed to broaden students' perspectives beyond their own culture or discipline and to provide an opportunity for the integration of knowledge gained in General Education courses taken previously. The course will have a rigorous writing component and is required for all students graduating from the Liberal Arts Program (this requirement applies to students who enroll in the Fall of 2007 or later).

#### LECTURE HOURS PER WEEK: 3 CREDIT HOURS: 3

**PREREQUISITES:** ENG 101, ENG 102. Students must be in their second year (i.e. 30+ credits) of the Liberal Arts and Sciences degree program to take this course.

### SECTION II

**A. SCOPE:** The topic for each section of the class will vary according to the individual instructor's design, but will typically include the help of guest professors and outside experts from different academic disciplines and areas. The course will feature student presentations, visits to outside institutions and organizations and provide a multidisciplinary perspective of the chosen theme or topic. Topics commonly used for the class have been "Immigration," "Counter Culture of the 1960s," "Freedom of Speech" and "Women Studies."

B. REQUIRED WORK: Determined by the instructor

**C. ATTENDANCE AND PARTICIPATION:** Students are expected to attend all classes and participate in the Seminar discussions, and lead at least one round table discussion. The professor will be available for individual consultation during scheduled office hours.

**D. METHODS OF INSTRUCTION:** Will vary according to instructor but may include but not be limited to seminar style discussions, guest lectures, field trips and project oriented collaborative learning activities. **E. OBJECTIVES, OUTCOMES, AND ASSESSMENT:**
