SUBJECT AREA AND COURSE NUMBER: POL* G110

COURSE TITLE: The Presidency

COURSE CATALOG DESCRIPTION: This is an interdisciplinary course in which emphasis will be placed on both the historical foundations of the American Presidency as well as its theoretical and modern political dynamics.

SECTION II

A. SCOPE: Through an interdisciplinary approach students will learn about the American Presidency by first examining the historical origins, evolution and development of the office -- including considering key presidents. The second half of the course will focus on the theoretical and modern political dynamics of the Presidency, including elections, relationship with the media, and rise of political consultants.

B. REQUIRED WORK: To be determined by the instructor and described in the course syllabus, but may include reading quizzes, written assignments, class presentations or projects and regular examinations.
